

WHY A TOMATO???



Pincushions come in all shapes and sizes, but the tomato is the design that prevails as the classic. Have you ever wondered why?

During the Victorian Era, folklore suggests that when a family moved into a new home, a fresh tomato was placed on the mantle to ward off evil spirits and thus bring prosperity to the new homeowners. Since tomatoes were only available in certain seasons and didn't stay fresh forever, the good-luck symbol was frequently fashioned from fabric and stuffed with sand or sawdust and made to look like the real thing. Eventually, the good-luck charm evolved into something more useful...a pin cushion!

Somewhere along the line, the little emery-filled strawberry (or some suggest it is a pepper) was added to clean and/or sharpen needles, however the effectiveness of this is debated.

Tips for Taking Photos of your Quilts

Due to improvements in mobile phone camera quality and the ease of electronically sharing photos, sophisticated cameras have largely been replaced by the cell phone. Consider the following tips for making the most of your quilt photos:

 If shooting indoors, place your quilt in a naturally well-lit room.
 Turn off artificial lights as they can add shadows and change color tones. Turn your phone's flash off.

2. Consider taking your quilt outdoors. Position your quilt so the sun is behind it. Optimal lighting exists during the



photographer's "golden hour" which is the hour before sunset and the hour after sunrise.

3. Squat (!) to bring your cameral level with the quilt. Tilt your phone to make sure the quilt fills the viewfinder *evenly* and is not skewed at an angle.

4. Don't be afraid to edit your shot using some of the simple functions on your phone to adjust lighting/exposure. Crop your photos to minimize background.
